Mapping of Baldernock -Every property in Baldernock has a unique property reference number (UPRN) against the address. It has been found that a few of the actual UPRN addresses, in East

Dunbartonshire Council's GIS (Geographic Information System) mapping are wrong, particularly in outlying areas. It is also the case that several properties are wrongly allocated to an incorrect road name. We have already identified some errors and will be submitting a list to EDC. They advise that every property should be allocated to a road name in their mapping. EDC has also advised that if there are issues with a delivery company or emergency service locating a property, if we let them know, they will investigate and liaise with the appropriate parties to alleviate issues. Outdoor Sketching around Baldernock Parish

I have always been interested in the experience of borders and edges – I used to live at the edge of the city and presently, I am living in my childhood home at the edge of Bearsden (not quite suburbia, not quite rural). I recently re-discovered Baldernock, an area I do not know well and did not know about at all as a child running around the Kessington fields. I have been enjoying walking and attempting to draw, around Blairskaith Linn. Strangely, from my first visit, I felt a strong connection to this place – perhaps because, although new to me, the landscape is familiar from other landscapes I have known and also, places I know well from a different viewpoint, can be seen differently from up here. And there is the sense again, of being on the edge of somewhere in this semi-rural location.



However, I find the activity of drawing outdoors quite difficult.....I feel self conscious of passers by; worry that I could be mugged if I lose myself too much in the flow of drawing; become hungry/ thirsty/ tired/ need the loo or am attacked by midgies; attract the



attention of interested dogs and so on. If none of that puts me off then The Critic steps in. I feel sure it wasn't like this for Ruskin and I can almost hear his scathing admonishments of my lack of discipline.

So I need your help:

I am keen to find people who might be interested in using drawing as a way of exploring their personal connection to the special location and environment of Baldernock Parish. This might relate to an interest in the natural environment here or to how the landscape has changed and evolved if you have known it over a long time, or it might be to do with the effects of this place upon you – how it affects your mind and body or how it exists in your personal memories, whether of here or other places.

The aim of the day is simply to enjoy the experience of drawing and chatting with no focus whatsoever on outcome or critique.

You don't need to have any prior experience of drawing, just come along with:

- A sketchbook and some drawing materials that are manageable to use outdoors.
- Perhaps something to sit on even if just a plastic bag.
- A flask with a hot drink and a snack would be a good idea.
- A willingness to chat.
-and of course warm, dry clothing and waterproof footwear!

I'm imagining that we would sketch on our own, though around the same location, then stop for a coffee and a chat together about what we're doing (no need to show anything unless you want to). Then sketch for a bit longer and end with a further chat about how the day has been. We would be out for between two to three hours.

While I do teach, I am not offering tuition – rather my hope is that we might be able to find ways to support each other, even if it's just by keeping an eye on the local dogs!
